Tourists gamble in Indian casinos less frequently than they do at the United States casinos, according to new research from the University of Minnesota. The study, published in the Journal of Urban Economics, provides new information about the way Americans spend their money when traveling abroad. University of Minnesota Professor of Economics Philip Babcock and his colleagues found that people age 18 to 54 are less likely to gamble at Indian-run casinos than they are at U.S. casinos. That's because people are more likely to gamble at U.S. casinos than to gamble at casinos in countries like China, Australia and Canada, where state-run government gambling operations are more prevalent. Researchers noted that Americans' interest in gambling abroad may be different than in the United States because of gambling attitudes and attitudes toward state government. "There are cultural components in that, because many Americans believe that gambling should be privately owned by individuals rather than be controlled and state-run," said Babcock, the study's lead author. The university's data was collected by the Asian Gaming Research Project, an academic initiative of the National Academy of Sciences. The research was funded by the National Science Foundation. In the study, researchers surveyed roughly 200 Americans at 44 countries. Researchers found that the majority of adult Americans are more likely to gamble abroad than at U.S.-run casinos. The study noted that the only casino in the United States that has a physical casino is in Las Vegas. "You would think that Americans who aren't U.S. citizens would have more interest in gambling than U.S. citizens," Babcock said. "Our findings suggest that there are some cultural factors, which I think are quite interesting." Babcock added that researchers don't know what drives the gamblers' preference for foreign-run casinos over U.S.-run casinos. "It
